## If Christianity is supposed to be such good news, then why does it so often sound like bad news?

Christianity is often described as a laundry of list of moralistic do's and don'ts (usually with a heavy emphasis on the don'ts). Alongside this list of prescribed behaviors, there is an implicit (sometimes it is explicit) incentive for good behavior (ie. blessings and rewards) or the threat of punishment for bad behavior (perhaps of the eternal kind). In other words, Christianity is often presented as Karma. If you do good things, then God will shower you with good things. If you do bad things, then God will punish you with bad things.

While it is true that some of this theology can be found in the Bible (it is called Deuteronomistic theology in academic circles), it is *not* the dominant narrative. And if it were, let's be honest, that would be pretty bad news.

One of my favorite theologians, Bono (who also happens to be an Irish Rock Star), explains:

"You see, at the center of all religions is the idea of Karma. You know, what you put out comes back to you: an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, or in physics—in physical laws—every action is met by an equal or an opposite one. It's clear to me that Karma is at the very heart of the universe. I'm absolutely sure of it. And yet, along comes this idea called Grace to upend all that 'as you reap, so you will sow' stuff. Grace defies reason and logic. Love interrupts, if you like, the consequences of your actions, which in my case is very good news indeed, because I've done a lot of stupid stuff. . . I'd be in big trouble if Karma was going to finally be my judge. It doesn't excuse my mistakes, but I'm holding out for Grace."

Like Bono, I know myself well enough to know that Karma would be bad news indeed, because in a world full of poverty, greed, violence, and prejudice, not a one of us is innocent. So, I'm also holding out for Grace.

Grace is the gift of God realized. And when you realize that gift, it changes you. Grace allows you to see beyond your own narcissism; it strengthens you to love not only your neighbor, but also your enemy. Grace humbles you and frees you. Grace is our only hope.

And Grace is at the heart of Christianity. That's not only good news for Bono of U2, it is good news for you, too (pun intended). And for me.

## NOTES FROM CANDY

On Sunday, August 18, we had a luncheon for parents of children through grade 5. At the meeting we discussed my philosophy of Children's Ministry as well as our plans for Fall. Below you will find a portion of our discussion.

#### Philosophy of Children's Ministry

I believe Children's Ministry should be for, with, and by children. What I mean by that is that some of the things we, as adults, must do for and with the children is to minister to them and to guide them; but, children are also ministers and they should be helped and encouraged to do ministry, also. They do that by participating in the various opportunities within a church, assisting other children with various tasks, acolyting, as well as visiting the nursing home, making cards for those in the hospital, etc.

I also believe that it is our responsibility as parents, adults working with children, and staff working with children to create a church where children experience God's love, feel included in the life of the congregation, and have opportunities to grow in their faith---so that children will flourish and grow in the light of God's love within the environment of our congregation. I cannot do this alone. You cannot do this alone. We are a team working together to bring these things about. We are blessed with the most important resource for this ministry-our love for children and our commitment to care for them. The Christian faith is communicated to children in essentially two places: the church and the family. It is the primary task of the church to transform persons into disciples. So we are to help children grow in their faith in ways that are appropriate for their age level. So how do we hope to do that at First Baptist?

As a person who is also a Minister of Music, I believe that one of the best ways to learn about ministry and worship is through music. One of my favorite quotes is:

Teach me a song and I will sing it today. Help me learn music and I will sing and praise God forever.

Children NEED to be in church and choir. Coming to church and being in choir are not decisions a child can make for himself or herself. Do we ask our children if they want to brush their teeth or if they want to go to school? No--we insist that our children do these things because they are good for them. It is GOOD for your child to be in church and in choir:

~It is part of growing up—a good experience-learning to be a part of a group

~It teaches teamwork and cooperation ~It is a way for children to give of themselves to God and the church

~They learn about worship and worship leadership

~It teaches them confidence and helps them with learning to be comfortable being in front of people—developing a presence for public speaking, etc. which will serve them well throughout life.

Choir is more than just singing—which happens to be a very important element of the overall experience. But in choir your child will learn through music about worship, worship leadership, the church year, music reading, how to use a hymnal, the Bible, ministry, and missions. We will have activities and games as well as singing and working on presentations for worship and for Christmas. Please encourage your child to participate in Children's Choir.

#### New Schedule and plans for the fall

It is precisely due to the reasons listed above that we have decided to make Children's Choir for grades 1-5 a weekly event. We will meet each Sunday at 5:00pm.

On the Sundays of SEE (Sept 8 and 22, Oct 13 and 27, and Nov 10), Children's Choir will meet 5:00-5:30pm followed by a time of activities and games 5:30-6:00 pm. Pre-school age children will have activities and games from 5:00-5:30pm and music time from 5:30-6:00pm. Kay Greene will be leading the preschool music time and I will assist her. I will lead Children's Choir and Kay will assist me. Peggy Edwards, Di Greene, Joyce Scoggins, and Susan Smith will lead the activity times.

The Sundays of which we do not have SEE, we will have Children's Choir from 5:00-6:00 pm. We will be working on a special musical play to be presented on the evening of December 8 in the sanctuary and having these extra times for preparation and rehearsal will help to ensure that the children are adequately prepared and will feel confident in presenting the message.

The main thing (schedule-wise) for parents to remember is that *children in grades 1-5 WILL MEET EVERY WEEK at 5:00 pm* (except on the 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays—there is one in September).

#### Registration

Please make sure your child is registered so we have vital info on all participants (we will have registration cards or sheets available on September 8). *Please bring your child to the door of the choir room and pick him/her up at the Children's Choir Room or other area (big room or playground) each week. Please park your car and come in. We ask this of you for your child's safety.*
