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Chat with the Preacher—Encouraging friendship in polarizing times

(I originally wrote this piece for Baptists Today / Nurturing Faith, but with the political season in full swing, it might be worth a revisit.)

We live in polarizing times.

Our two-party political system (along with their cable news spin-doctors) bears much responsibility for this reality. The tired, binary thinking of our current political structures reduce complex issues into simplistic categories like: left/right, conservative/progressive, pro-life/pro-choice, religious/secular, open-minded/closed-minded, good/evil, etc. Reducing complicated matters into partisan sound bites achieves little besides the further polarization of constituents, congregations, and communities.

Churches are also guilty. That Christianity is often described as conservative or progressive speaks of our captivity to American political discourse. Unfortunately, our commitment to conservatism or progressivism (or whatever "-ism" we practice) is often stronger than our commitment to Christ. Instead of allowing Scripture and theology to challenge our deeply held political beliefs, it is usually the other way around—we allow our political convictions to inform our theology and reading of Scripture. This is problematic.

Instead of contributing to further polarization, churches should encourage friendship. Especially since Jesus expects his followers to love people with whom we disagree or dislike: "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven" (Matt 5:43-45a). I know I'm not the only one who wishes Jesus would leave some wiggle room about whom we are called to love—but he doesn't.

These are a few practices that might help:

1. Encourage good citizenship

Followers of Jesus are citizens of the kingdom of heaven (Phil 3:20). This doesn't mean that we should not be good citizens of the nation in which we live. But it does mean that our ultimate loyalty is not to any nation or political party. Learning to first think of ourselves as members of Christ's Body—a community that extends beyond national borders—reorients the way in which we view everything. We can no longer just wonder what's good for me, or my family, or my country, but we must consider what is good for the wider community.

2."Thou shalt have no other gods before me"

Idolatry is a most unoriginal sin. Unfortunately, we are uniquely "gifted" when it comes to this disordered love. We have a way of making gods out of anything, especially our opinions.

Instead of worshipping the God who created us, we end up worshipping a god of our own making—a god who looks like us, thinks like us, acts like us, and votes like us. As Anne Lamott writes, "You can safely assume you've created God in your own image when it turns out that God hates all the same people you do."

3. Practice humility

If you have a hard time admitting you're wrong, or you haven't changed your mind about something important in the last few years, or you agree with a major political party on every significant issue, then you have an opportunity for growth.

I am also learning the limits of stereotypes. I know a "right-winger" who tirelessly works to help the poor. I know a self-described "liberal" who takes Scripture as seriously as anyone I know.

The need to dismiss or demonize the other is rooted in narcissism and hubris, and we are all guilty. Following Jesus should make us humble, not arrogant. And besides, it is freeing to know that I don't always have to be right.

4. Listen to more than one viewpoint

Our culture is so polarized that we can select the partisan perspective from which our news is delivered. We can arrange our social media feed to only show like-minded content (it's easy to "unfollow" Facebook friends with differing views). We can attend churches that never challenge our thinking and living. And if we are not careful, we can surround ourselves with people who see the world just like we do.

I have found that Catholic social teaching often challenges my anemic thinking. Here's an example from Bishop Robert McElroy:

"The Republican Party better reflects the commitment to protect unborn life, reject euthanasia and promote religious liberty. The Democratic Party witnesses more effectively to Catholic teaching on the issues of poverty and inequality, immigration reform, restorative justice and the environment. On the critical question of family life, each party reflects certain key elements of the core common good, while on the issues of the radical need to address global poverty and the fundamental question of the role of warfare in American foreign policy, neither party embodies even an acceptable threshold commitment to achieving the Catholic vision of justice and peace in the world [emphasis added]."

Can we least admit that God is not a Republican or a Democrat?

5. Gather at the table

While many consider regular church attendance and participation passé, this is still one of the best practices for encouraging friendship and resisting partisan polarization. When we faithfully gather around the table for The Lord's Supper, covered-dish meals, and even committee meetings, we are reminded of our common faith, and our common need for mercy and grace.

We are reminded that we are wonderful-flawed-beautiful-broken children of God—every last one of us.

And that's not a bad starting place for friendship if you ask me.
